1:44 Why do you think I got an Apple? Because it's just a hair easier. Well, my that's how my dad is and I get it.

I mean, when

1:51 I'm, you know, y'all's age, my dad's age, who knows what technology is going to look like. I will definitely, you know, have a hard time as well, right?

2:00 I'm actually scared of that. I'm scared of what that's going to look like. And it's really not that far off. I mean, you know, to where the tech is in your

2:09 body, where they want to put, you know, connect human with technology, it's right around the corner. I mean, it's

2:16 not that far away. Yeah, absolutely. I mean, look at the from

2:22 1980 on, the computer industry has just taken off.

2:27 Yeah. And and obviously, you know, from if you look at it from afar, you can tell that that was already packaged and ready to go. They were already using it.

2:36 I mean, if you look at NASA, NASA had touchscreens in like the, you know, whatever 1950s or something like that, you know, like iPads. Like, they had

2:45 iPad touchscreens. So, it's that's just one of those repurposed tech deals I I feel um that was around at some point in some form or fashion, right? Who knows?

2:57 Very interesting because times have really progressed. My dad, I found a certificate in the drawer right after he

3:05 died and he had flown in the Navy every prop engine plane from 1930 to 1960.

3:15 Wow. Every prop engine plane that the Navy ever flew, he had flown. No way. No. How many people?

3:24 How many people? And he was a commander in a carrier. Whenever he flew onto a carrier of 5,000 people, there was never more than five people that outranked him.

3:34 Really? Wow.

3:36 He was a carrier pilot and he went in right after World War II. Right after it. Right after it.

3:44 Close call.

3:47 Yeah, [laughter] that's crazy. So, he he actually like the big carrier planes, like the big big boys, everything everything that was a prop

3:56 engine. Now, his brother was a year older than him and he flew the first squadron of F9

4:04 jets off of a carrier. He was one of the only four pilots and he became not only a captain of a bay captain of a carry

4:12 but my dad's brother became a rear admiral in the 1980s and then he quickly didn't like the

4:20 politics so he retired and [laughter] retired in Sacramento and so yeah yeah did you ever get did you go into

4:27 the military boy I my dad wanted me in the worst way

4:34 he wanted me to train to be pilot and uh I thought it was more interesting to get married and start having kids.

4:42 Well, thank goodness I went into the trades. Uh I went into uh pipe fitting, plumbing, HVAC, and now I I

repair

4:52 boilers and chillers at a major university to uh keep things comfortable in the buildings.

4:59 Yeah. Well, that's great. Well, and I mean that's the way to go even nowadays, you know, uh, you know, that kind of job. I mean, it's I think people are

5:07 starting to realize like a four-year degree is not worth it anymore. I can't tell you how many I, you know, and I say this, I wish I completed college. I wish

5:16 I could go. Of course, my addiction got in the way with that, but um, but a lot of my friends that have gotten four-year degrees and even gone back and got their

5:24 masters, you know, they're trying to find a job and it's hard. It's it's really hard. And then when they get a job, it's not, you know, to the level

6:30 And that was big for a hundred years, but now that we got AI know. Yeah. And that's coming in quick.

6:38 It's coming in a little too quick, isn't it? A lot of jobs are going to be gone in the next five years.

6:43 Yeah, they are. And it's going to be like a switch turn on. And that's what's kind of scary is like there's a lot of other stuff in the world going on right

6:51 now, too. And then you pile that on top of it and people losing their jobs and not having money and you just don't know

10:45 My mom went there. No way. Yes. We're making way too many connections.

10:50 And and after this, we've got some people in here. Finally, we'll do an introduction, but I want to uh I want to show you this. Have you know what it

10:58 looks like? The Northern Illinois. Have you ever seen Northern Illinois University? Through your video.

11:04 Okay. Okay. Okay. So, you saw it. your video I saw.

11:07 Yeah. Isn't that crazy, dude? [laughter] It's so freaking crazy. Let's see. Where is that? Well, anyways, we'll just we'll get we'll get going. People are already

11:15 flooding the the messages. So, um thank you all for being here, guys. Uh this is going to be a good one today. Like I said, I met I met Jack through a comment

11:24 that he um that he left on one of my videos talking about his great-grandfather. We're going to get into that and so much more. Um so, thank

11:33 you all for being here. And Jack, thank you for being here. Um, he's got a lot of stories. I've heard I've heard a lot of them, but I know he's got a lot more

11:40 that I haven't heard and it's going to be very entertaining and a lot of his stories point to our theories and they

11:47 align with them and, you know, it shows that there's some truth. Of course, we don't have, you know, signed paperwork to show everybody, but this is this is

11:56 what we need, right? This is uh these are the little nuggets of truth that we need that can take us somewhere else.

12:02 And really Jack gave me his family information and then I took took it and found some more information and now

12:09 we're talking about that together so we can go on to the next, you know, on to the next uh stage of his

family history.

12:17 But Jack, please introduce yourself. Uh, you know, anything you want to say about yourself and and then you can kind of get into your family history. A lot

12:25 of these people are here because they saw those videos, so they know. Well, the one thing I agreed to was to come on

12:32 and say hi because I know two or three people said, "Oh, yeah, uh, Jack was just something you made up and posted on

12:39 your own video." And no, I you know, I just never comment on PE I'm an old guy.

12:47 I I I like listening and watching videos on YouTube. I love history.

12:55 The biggest thing is your uh yesterday you did a video with Chris uh Old World Exploration.

13:03 Exploration. Yep. A couple days ago. Yep. Yeah. He's fantastic. Chris is awesome, dude. He is so great.

13:10 Yes. Shout out your two videos and then with you two getting together, you're a match that's

13:17 made for each other to talk about this subject of Yeah. older buildings and what's going on. Yeah.

13:24 And that's the best way to put it. But yeah, I'm real. I'm here. And I will I will give one bit of advice.

13:32 Logan, wow.

13:34 I knew a little about my family and then you dug up the rest out of all kinds of

13:41 records for days that you searched. Then I went to other family members and found

13:48 out what I could dig more into which we we have done that and and get confirmation. You got a lot of confirmation.

13:58 Yeah.

13:59 Okay. Go ahead and you start it and go all the way back to possibly 1850.

14:08 And I'll just interject a little because you explained it before the video a little bit better than I did.

14:16 Okay. Well, yeah. And and just to kind of give a um a rundown of his comment, Jack left uh you know, one of these

14:25 comments that he left on my videos. And the first one was, "Hey, my greatgrandfather uh or your grandfather

14:32 told you that his grandfather, right?" So, your great-grandfather, is that right, JJ?

14:38 Yeah. Okay. So, my grandfather told me about his father.

14:42 Okay. You're Yes. Thank you. I get [laughter] You say that enough you get confused where you're at. um told told him about his father that he was a

14:51 high-ranking Mason in New York um and was sent was trusted by his Masonic lodge to go onto the Santa Fe Trail

14:59 which can goes up from the northeast down to Santa Fe through the Midwest and start a town, start a town. And he did.

15:07 And he went to can uh he went to Council Grove, Kansas. That's where you know the name he came up with. which you just

15:14 found the town and they came up with name.

15:17 There you go. And and I I've found, you know, I found his greatgrandfather and I found uh the gentleman before him, found

15:26 his brother. Uh found a lot of people within the family. And let's just go ahead and I'm going to pull up uh his

15:33 father, grand greatgrandfather. Geez, that's going to be really hard to say, but let me pull this up and you can kind of riff off of it.

15:40 Just put f just say family. [laughter] Okay. Yeah. Right. just like [clears throat] him and that I verified through family members that is my grandfather's father.

15:52 Okay. This is the man that that the story goes that he was sent to Kansas to to found a town, right? And what we're

16:01 kind of finding out is that maybe it could have been a gentleman earlier, which would have been Jack. This would

16:08 have been his his father, right? John's father or his brother. Uh well Allan

16:17 Allan had a dry goods store next to the saddle store, right? That was his brother.

16:23 So Augustus had the saddle store, I believe. And then Allan was even before that. So So Clarence Clarence Cwley, uh

16:33 this is this is after your after JJ Cwley that we just showed. Um I guess would be his son, one of his sons. Yeah.

16:42 Fun.

16:42 Okay. It says 60 years ago his grandfather Alan Cwley came to that old historic town of Council Grove and thus

16:50 the pioneers of the Neoso Valley. So it says it right there that a Crowley Allen Crowley was the the pioneer of the Neoso

16:59 Valley. And you know I'd love for you to kind of explain what you said uh what you said about you know taking the Santa Fe Trail and picking your choice. Could you kind of get into that?

17:10 That came up with some family members and what they remember I they had the same assignment I did in

17:17 high school. You must talk to somebody in the 1800s. Well, our grandparents were born in 1890, my dad 1930, myself

17:27 1960. So, you know, it's one of those things that uh my grandmother and grandfather were well before 1900.

17:37 Okay.

17:39 So, in interviewing for this history assignment in high school in the early 1970s,

17:46 um [clears throat] uh uh he um [clears throat] was in New York as a high ranking Mason.

17:58 Yes.

17:59 That's that's all I got out of him. My dad was a high ranking Mason in New York. Then through other family members,

18:05 I found out that yes, he was sent from New York to go somewhere in the Midwest,

18:13 maybe Kansas, but from the 1830s to the 1850s, the word on the street was along

18:20 the Santa Fe Trail getting back to the Masonic Lodge, which was the biggest one

18:27 in New York City in the East Coast. The word got back that along the Santa Fe Trail from the 1830s to the 1850s, there

18:37 was several cities that were completely built out and nobody living there.

18:43 Boom. Not just Council Grove, Kansas.

18:49 Yes. So that that this whole trail was built out. You know what? That's exactly what he's saying. Built out long before. Yes. Yeah. Yeah.

18:56 And so anyway, through we're speculating 1850ish to 1854ish.

19:06 They're traveling and somehow someway they run across the little town. They

19:13 go, "We're going to all stop here." And here they named themselves Council Grove, Kansas.

19:22 Then, as you saw, you pulled up a store from my great-grandfather, JJ Crowley, uh,

19:31 the salary, and then next door, the dry goods store, a granite building that was already there.

19:40 And all my family members said, "Yes, we remember all this." And but you got to think to have that

19:48 picture in the 1860s already. and a store, two stores being well established.

19:55 I bet that was done in the 1850s. Yeah.

19:59 Not not the 1860s most like. See, if y'all see here, so they had a harness store, right? It says harness. Then you look down here, it

20:06 says Miss JJ Cwley's saddle. So boom, it's it's got the name JJ. That's his that's that's the man. That's the man we're talking about.

20:15 J Crowley. Yes. And then Augustus, the brother, Augustus had the grocery store.

20:21 And you think about it, okay, if they were founding this town, you're going to have the grocery store and saddle. I mean, these people are coming in and out

20:29 of this town on the Santa Fe Trail. Look in this photo. You got you got horse and buggy, three horse and buggies right

20:36 there, you know? So, a salary, you're making some money, right? Wouldn't you say?

20:41 Well, and look at that building. To me, that looks like that was the biggest and best building. Yes.

20:48 Of the downtown of that town. So, they just when they got there, they just took over the best buildings.

20:56 You got it. So, this this photo shows Main Street. Okay. On the Santa Fe Trail. So, Main Street through Council Grove is the Santa Fe Trail. That's part

21:05 of it. In historic Council Grove in the early 1900s, so this is way later.

21:10 Storefronts pictured include the racket central market, Miss JJ Crowley, salary, the Brunswick billard parlor and

21:17 Mitchell and Ly are visible above other businesses. So yeah, I mean this is this road right here is part of the Santa Fe

21:25 Trail, which I actually didn't connect that and read that up there. That's pretty incredible. That is pretty cool.

21:31 And I was and I was told that their businesses then were on the Santa Fe Trail. So that makes sense that Main Street was the part of the Santa Fe Trail.

21:40 Yes.

21:41 And Okay. The neat thing about that that you dug up that proves my story, him and

21:48 his brother being Mason Brothers and all that crap.

21:54 Um and and of course they brought people out from New York to start the town. So they didn't just one or two people move

22:01 in. It was like a group that were sent there to start the town.

22:05 Yes. You said you said 70 people or something like that. I think I was told through my grandfather there was anywhere from 60 to 100 people that

22:14 left New York alto together. So there was safety in numbers. So when you had an old musket rifle if you ran across the Indians, there were enough people

22:23 that you could def defend yourself because you're going into Indian country. He was very firm about that.

22:28 They had enough people to where they could defend themselves if they ran into hostile Indians.

22:34 Yeah. That tells me it was the early 1850s because you still had the India problem at that time period. Yeah.

22:40 And then they instantly had a town that they can move into. Now, I was told that my greatgrandfather, my

22:48 grandfather's father, was wellliked. I mean, yes, he had business in town and was one of the persons

leading everybody to get there.

22:58 He was so well liked because he just the word on the street was he helped everybody. Well, here let's help him move in. Let's do this. Let's do that.

23:06 And he organized the town very well amongst everybody that initially came out from New York.

23:13 So my grandfather told me that he was instrumental for years and everybody moving into the town. Let's get you a place to live. We got lots of places here for you. All built out of granite.

23:24 We can move you in. And everyone loved him because he was just so helpful and loving and and feel welcomed into the

23:32 town. Well, he was so well loved that yes, he wasn't registered as the mayor, but in that

23:40 town that they named from about 19 1850 on for 20 years, it wasn't a town, but he was considered the mayor of that area.

23:50 The mayor. Yeah. Because he was the most liked person and he was calling the shots. I mean, he's a

he's amazing. So, uh, you know, I mean, that

23:59 that makes sense. That makes sense, right? And I was going to pull up this um so this is a a death uh certificate,

24:06 you know, of different names in uh Council Grove in their uh secret orders.

24:12 Okay. And this is the first thing I actually found. Okay. So I found JJ Cwley, which is John James Cwley, right?

24:20 The man we're talking about. He died the 26th of December 1897. He was an Oddfellow. He was in the Oddfellow's

24:27 lodge number 43. Okay. And then as Cwley is his brother. Okay. He was an odd fellow. And uh I guess this is the

24:36 Masonic Lodge I would believe. But um you can also find this. Where is it?

24:43 Here it is. So in my video I showed y'all they might have misspelled Cwley.

24:49 Okay. So this is for the uh Oddfellows Lodge and then this one's for the Council Grove Lodge number 36. Okay.

24:57 October 21st 1st, 1862. So that's pretty far back. And this this says JJ Crowley,

25:04 but you know, we've the only there's a ton of crawlies in uh Council Grove. So I think it was a you know, a mistype. It

25:13 was just a uh they they forgot the W. So here it is. You know, he's in the lodge and he's in the International Oddfellows, which the Oddfellows is a whole another rabbit hole. That's odd.

25:25 It's odd to say the least, but yes.

25:27 But yeah, we've we've got we've got some proof of this happening. [snorts] We've got the proof of the story that I was told directly by my grandfather that

25:36 Yeah. Mason, New York, Get Out West, uh somewhere on the F Santa Fe Trail

25:44 because there was multiple cities that nobody was living in that from 1830 to 1850 were reported back to

New York and

25:54 said, "Man, when we went down the trail, there were all these cities that were built out all made out of, if you want

26:02 to call it granite or you want to call it stone, and no one's there. Yep.

26:08 Now, that part makes me confused. I don't know why that is all. But then

26:16 again, you and Chris are going over all these places, courouses in the 1800s, schools, you name it, where they're all

26:24 built out of very hard stone, whether it's marble, granite, or any other stone that's extremely difficult. When you're

26:33 living in a 12 foot by 12 foot wooden hut, but you're building magnificent

26:41 I'm pulling it up. I'm pulling up their courthouse like like this is what th this is what we see, guys, right? This is what we see. And this this is their

26:49 courthouse in the 19th century. I don't have the date on me right now, but this is what they're talking about, right?

26:57 This is what they walked up to. So my point of view is you walk up to this after leaving New York and traveling for

27:04 a couple of months on horseback and you walk up to something like that, nobody's living in it, you don't even know what to think.

27:12 Yeah. Yeah.

27:14 You're like, whoa, that's mine.

27:18 Yeah. [laughter] Right.

27:20 That's funny. But look at it. I mean, it's just like every old world courthouse. I mean, how many states have we seen that that I talk about, well,

27:28 this was this was built in the 1870s, you know, for it would took one year or two years. I mean, this is your classic old world. And then if you look if you

27:37 look at the other counties around that area. So, this is um this is Cottonwood Falls, if you can see that

fairly well.

27:44 This one's a better photo. Look at this.

27:46 All right. This is also very early 19th century built. These are the counties right around Council Grove. Okay. Um

27:55 yeah. All together there. So here we go. Emporia. Look at this.

28:00 That verifies the story told to me by my grandfather where there was multiple

28:09 cities along the Santa Fe Trail because he wasn't specifically told to go to Kansas. Just go to the Santa Fe Trail and follow it.

28:16 Figure it out. Wherever you want to end up at, just all go together. The group of people that left Yes. New York. Yes.

28:24 Go together and just settle a town.

28:27 Yeah. So, do you think I wonder if they were told that there's these buildings or they figured that out themselves?

28:33 Like I I I guess it kind of sounds like they discovered that oh this is built out and instead of saying but he was in the he was in the Masonic order so maybe

28:42 there was a little bit of whisper of hey you know you can go get your own town and start it up you know get you know what I mean you would think that's

28:50 probably what was whispered in his ear right absolutely yeah I mean they had to have known that's

28:57 been that's been the whole secret right it's a secret order and I think that's part of the big secret yeah Yeah. So,

29:04 and um so JJ JJ Cwley, the gentleman we're talking about that found that was my grandfather's father.

29:10 Your grandfather's father. Thank you. Um he was married to Alice Bell Curtis. Okay.

29:18 Second marriage. Okay, there you go. So, Alice Bell Curtis, let's pull up the family tree right here. Let me share the

29:25 screen. And uh so here we go. John James Cwley Jr., right? That's my dad.

29:33 That's your dad.

29:34 I'm so I'm sorry. No, I am so sorry. That is my grandfather. That is your grandfather. His wife.

29:40 Yes. Okay. That there you go. So, and then earlier on, John James Cwley, Senior. Here's the man we're talking about. 1845 to 1897. Okay.

29:51 Yes. Go ahead. That is my dad's grandfather.

29:55 Your dad's grandfather. And was married to Alice Bell Curtis. Right.

29:59 Correct. and she was much much younger woman. He was a he was an older man, his second marriage, right? Um and then I

30:07 kind of wanted you to to go on about what what did it ended up happening to Alice and like where where she went, where you know the the kids went and all that.

30:16 [snorts]

30:17 The word on the street was early 18 uh uh late 1880s or 1890. His first wife

30:25 had died and it was either left with three boys and a girl or four boys and a

30:32 girl. Okay. Uh after John James Crowley died, they dispersed and no one I was

30:40 told ever lived in the town direct lineage of mine.

30:45 Most people went to Texas. Alice Bell Curtis grabbed her brand new baby, John James Crowley,

30:53 grabbed the brand new baby and wanted a brand new start in life. Yeah.

30:59 And um in 1890 she was like 20 and he was like 50, but it was a second marriage. She wanted to be married when

31:07 she married John James Crowley. Alice Bell Curtis wanted to marry somebody prominent and famous. So they just got together. They had the one child and that was my grandfather.

31:18 Alice Bel Curtis never remarried. Moved to California

31:25 and raised my grandfather and she lived all the way till 1955

31:31 and then died of old age and um uh never remarried.

31:37 Yeah. And I wonder what story she went with, you know, like there's no telling what she knew. And what we thought originally and what Jack thought was

31:45 that they couldn't really find any footprints of them in Council Grove because she might have changed their name, right? Think about founding this

32:35 Correct. So, okay. So, she never went by Alice Crowley, even though sometimes she did, but everybody knew her as Alice Bell Curtis.

32:45 Interesting. Okay. So, that that makes sense. It's kind of pointing to exactly what I'm saying.

32:50 You're gonna stay with the name you were born with and go on. Yeah.

32:54 Because you don't want any ties to a bad feeling or situation that you had.

33:00 Yes. Okay. So, and I'm going to get into some of So, uh, John J. Crowley's brother, who is Augustus Crowley, who I

33:08 just showed was was uh the name above John JJ Crowley, right? When I was showing you the the Oddfellows, they were in the Oddfellows in the death

33:16 certificate of when they died. Um, so he had a he had a son. The son was uh

33:22 Clarence A. Crawley. So another Cwley born in born in 1880 in Council Grove.

33:29 And this man was an interesting one to find. So this is this is you know generations after still having a lot of control. Okay. He was look how he kind of helped run the town.

33:41 You got it. And that's what I'm Yes. So he he was a an attorney. Of course, right? Attorneys have a lot of stuff. Prominent member.

33:51 Yep. And a judge. Yes. You got it. He was a prominent member of the legal and civic community. Okay. and his masonic

33:59 and fraternal uh connections was this is this is it. So he was a royal archmason.

34:04 Okay. Chapter 60. He was a knight's templar people which is that's a that's that's another level I feel like or you

34:12 know it's up there. Um he was he was in the shrine. Okay. He was Isis temple of the mystic shrine in Selena.

34:20 Um and then it says other local lodge activities. So this man was he had a lot of ties and this was generational, you know, this was

34:28 I don't think you get that far up the ladder in a small town. Yeah. Right.

34:33 If if if the the father and the brother weren't like the founders.

34:38 Yes. Right. Yeah. He was pretty much everything you need to be to have some control in that town. So yeah, that when I found Clarence, I was like, "Oh, okay.

34:47 It's still, you know, it still was going." And I wonder did your grandfather ever did he get into any kind of secret societies or did he ever

34:55 dabble in that area? Do you know or No. Yeah.

35:00 He came out to California and every time he because I said, "Well,

35:07 grandpa interviewing him in the early 70s." Well, did you ever become a Mason or this or that or No, my mother would not let me join anything.

35:19 Alisel Curtis. Well, that makes sense.

35:22 He just worked hard all his life, got married, had three kids, and uh he he was a hard worker all his life and never uh he never even went to church.

35:35 Yeah. Really?

35:37 And never went to church. never did any just just worked hard and and raised his kids.

35:43 Interesting. Yeah. And and so you know I have some questions in here uh that that that are really interesting questions,

35:52 right? So, um, uh, Ku Sae Cusay,

35:58 [laughter]

35:59 she said, uh, she or he said, "Why would it take so many centuries to discover these buildings if

America uh, colonies

36:06 had already been established for centuries?" And again, like that's what we're told. It's been, you know, America colonies were established for centuries.

36:15 But, you know, uh, I mean, it wasn't easy to get around, right? I mean, the Kansas from New York, like there's a lot of land in between there, right? When

36:23 you're going on horseback, like I'm sure you could find stuff all the time that hadn't been found because you're on foot, you know, you're on foot going to

36:31 different places. But it is a very interesting thing. And I I think um a lot of the uh history that would tell us

36:38 that these buildings were here somehow has completely vanished. I mean, you know, there's paper trails somewhere or

36:46 you know, you know what I mean? like there's got to be some early settlers that discussed this and uh you do have

36:53 some stories about about that and which we'll get into in a little bit. But yeah, what do you think about

37:09 Thank you. I like the evidence that there's you and everyone in your

37:16 community. Look at the evidence. Hey, there's an incredible

37:22 building in this town, in this town, in this town. How did that get built? But I go one step further. You in your video

37:32 show these magnificent buildings of old world. Then there's another channel

37:40 that's called Hidden Truth. Hidden Truth. Yeah.

37:44 And what he has done throughout the East Coast and a little bit inland is go to all these public buildings and then he

37:53 walks around the outside and goes, "Wow, what a

building." And it says it's built

37:59 from 1880 to 1890, blah blah blah. How come they're the story with everything

38:06 is uh 1850 to 1900 and only right in there. All of it. All of it. Right there. All of it. Yeah.

38:13 Which means that's a lie in my book.

38:15 Only me. I'm only me saying that. I think it's a lie. Yeah.

38:20 Next he walks inside. That guy is awesome. Hidden truth. Hidden truth. You showed me some of his videos. He is.

38:28 Go get Go, guys. marble columns on the interior. And he proved that the marble

38:36 on the flooring and the marble in the columns, he found buildings where that marble was from all over the world.

38:45 If you're just beginning a society, Yeah.

38:49 and you can barely build [laughter] a 10 foot by 10 foot wooden house with an ough house dug 10 feet

behind your house to go to the bathroom in. Yeah.

39:00 And you're building these amazing stone structures, but inside is more amazing.

39:08 Unbelievable marble flooring, marble, beautiful 60 foot tall columns.

39:15 Yeah. Yeah.

39:16 And it it Okay. That type of thing, that's what blows me away. It's like, wait a minute, the interior is more glorious than the exterior.

39:28 Yeah. by a long shot and some of the things and you're making me think of you know I have a video oh it was actually the video that you commented on the very

39:36 first time you commented on when I was talking about Iowa and their capital in Iowa is just I mean here I I'll pull up

39:44 a picture but um it it was talking about you know building it in the in the 1870s

39:51 and that there's 22 different types of granite from Europe and from Mexico like 22 different types. Like what are you

40:00 talking in the 1870s? They really cared that much. And listen listen this is 24 25 years after they became a state. Iowa

40:10 becomes a state. Then 25 years later, they're going to build a capital of this scale and with 25 different

40:17 show the building and then see if you can find a picture of the inside because I studied that for three months and if

40:25 you can get detail inside of some photos, you will be blown away.

40:31 Oh yeah. Oh yeah. Look at just the outside point. Now look at that Capitol building and look at the go the golden dome, right? the Golden Dome. Look at this.

40:42 Okay, this is 25 I'm gonna say it again.

40:44 25 years after they became a state, they decided to build a state capital and this is what it is. Look at the inside, guys. Look at this. Look at those stairs. I've never seen that picture.

40:54 Wow.

40:55 First of all, every ounce of construction on that building was the hardest format to do for horse

41:04 and buggy people. [laughter] Yeah, dude. Oh, look at this. Golly, this is phenomenal. Phenomenal. I mean,

41:14 it's perfect. It's perfect. It's perfect, people. Look at this. Wow.

41:22 Look at that. I mean, the interior of that blowsc.

41:27 It's not just that the exterior out of if it if it somehow it's cut granite or some type of cut hard stone that's

41:36 probably as solid as granite. Let's not worry about what the material was. It's built of very heavy type stone.

41:46 And if you ask my opinion, it's cut so perfectly it could be nicknamed laser cut.

41:55 It could be. Yeah, it does.

41:57 Nicknamed laser cut. But there's been people that have gone up to some of these buildings and they can't find one

42:05 chisel mark. So it's like, well, I'm part of the crowd that says, I have no idea how they cut the stone, where they

42:13 quarried it from, how they transported tens of thousands of pounds of each stone. Some on the foundation level are

42:22 considered one to 200,000 pounds a piece. You can't carry that in a wooden axled

42:31 in any way back with w with with with dirt roads, too.

42:35 Like I mean you're it's not it's just not it's not going to happen. It ain't going to happen.

42:39 It's not going to happen in a soft dirt road with no mud. It's not going to happen. No.

42:45 No. So there's there's factors involved here in my mind.

42:50 Last three years I've dug into history so hard and I've been I've got a group of people. I actually have a professor

42:59 in Europe that I talk to nightly about all the old world buildings in France, Germany,

43:07 and in and in that area, and we just go back and forth like, oh my god.

43:14 Why didn't we see this before?

43:17 Yeah. Yeah. and and like so it's it's great to have you on Jack because I think a lot of people including myself

43:26 think of the older generations not seeing this like never seeing it and before you you know before we met I

43:34 actually had a conversation with my uh my wife's grandfather uh lovely man just

43:40 he's he's just the best and he was talking so he saw my my uh videos cuz cuz my wife's mom you know, follows me

43:49 and loves it. Um, and so she showed her dad, you know, my my wife's uh grandfather, and he kind of cornered me

43:56 one day in the house, okay? And he started to say, you know, I really like your videos, and I'm like, "Oh my god,

44:03 oh no." Like he saw my, you know, like, you know, very man's man. He he owned, you know, a tool shop, the one of the

44:12 only tool shops for a long time in our small hometown of Bay City. um and you know just a man's man. So I I didn't think that he would ever catch that.

44:21 Well, it was the complete opposite. He said, "Listen, I went to Europe one time and you know, we're going on tours to

44:29 these different castles and which Europe's a whole different ballgame, right, with this, but it's it's a good ball game to start at." And he said they

44:36 were telling us about how these farmers and these, you know, people living in, you know, wooden shacks and then coming to work on this castle. He said, "I

44:45 didn't believe it one bit." He said, "I didn't know. I didn't know what the answer was, the right answer was,

but he

44:52 said that when I started to hear some of these stories and looking at these castles that were around him and some of these buildings in Europe, he he said

45:01 there's no way." He and and and being, you know, a man's man and knowing how to use tools and knowing, you know, like he

45:09 knows he knows that that couldn't have ever happened. But a lot of people just kind of throw it in the back of their mind as you know, as we all do, right,

45:17 on things that we we don't really understand. But there's a lot more of, you know, my wife's grandfather and Jack's out there. So I I'm kind of

45:25 encouraging people to go to your grandparents, go to your parents, you know, go to your grandparents' friends and and just bring it up. Bring it up,

45:34 you know, and see what they Again, I couldn't have said it better.

45:36 Yeah. Yeah. Just bring it up because the older people, even my dad never thought of some of

45:45 these old buildings that he was around that they couldn't have just built it.

45:50 Why not? They they set the history is oh they just they threw this up in six years, right?

45:56 Uh think of the logistics when you're starting with a one to 200,000 pound uh foundation block and then building on that these monster buildings.

46:07 Oh, and the inside of them is at a monster height.

46:12 So you know, you're looking at something that doesn't make sense for the average five to six foot person.

46:18 50 feet in the air. Yeah. And it's, you know, Yeah, that's right. Exactly. Like the inside ceilings are 50 feet tall.

46:25 Like, well, how did they how did that work? How [laughter] How does that even work?

46:29 [clears throat]

46:30 Yeah.

46:30 I'm just saying it it's just now starting to come out with the computer age and us asking one question, then

46:39 another question is is directing itself, and another question like, wait a minute, this doesn't make sense.

46:47 That don't fit. That don't fit. don't fit.

46:51 So, don't fit, Chris. Chris, so when me and Chris were talking, we were we were discussing like that, you know, how did we miss this?

46:59 How I always ask people when I'm when I'm interviewing, how have we missed this? And you know, the majority of people and what I what I've thought is

47:07 that there's some sort of veil that is falling down. There is some sort of connected consciousness out here that

47:14 we're all, you know, attuning to. we're all, you know, you know, and it's it's the uh I said it on his podcast, but it's the hundth monkey effect, right?

47:23 Once one person starts to figure out, you know, the truth, then another person, another person. Well,

when there's enough people figuring out the

47:31 truth, then it starts to really catch on, right? And that's what seems to be happening. I think uh we're all seeing

47:37 with with the right eyes right now. And it's it's really like a domino effect at this point. I looked into um early

48:25 You know what I mean? Yeah. Right.

48:28 You [laughter] get 1700s. You get, you know what I mean? Yes, there's a flood of journals from the 1700s. There is they're they're there.

48:37 Very few journals from the 1600s.

48:42 I I I've got a friend that I talked to about history and we are both a little far out there.

48:49 We both have a theory that maybe America wasn't found. There's a stone in the Boston Harbor that's carved 1620.

49:00 Let me pull that up. Let me find it.

49:02 There's a stone in Boston Harbor that's got a carving of 1620. Evidently, that

49:09 stone of carved 1620 was very important at the time.

49:18 I speculate, and I'm the only one in my family that even thinks this, no one else does, that that's when they founded Boston.

49:27 That's when that my other friend and I even believe that there was no such thing as Christopher

49:35 Columbus. He was a complete madeup story.
[laughter] Yeah. Yeah. I can get on and I am the only person in America that believes that. No one else does. And

49:44 it's okay. It's just I believe that in 1620 I believe a little before that they did

49:52 the English did come over. Okay. and probably in the 1500s. But the first colony of people probably came over in

50:02 1620 to colonize the East Coast from uh the Boston area, Philadelphia area,

50:11 all the way down to the Carolas to just colonize it. Okay. And I think that's when it really got started. Not in the

50:19 15, not in the um uh late 1400s or any of that, right? I think let's call it the early 1600s.

50:34 Yeah. You know, it just it Why is there a stone that says 1620? That had to be of grave importance to somebody at that time period.

50:46 Yeah, I think it is still there. No, it is. This is It's uh
Is it the Plymouth Rock?

50:51 Is that where Yeah, it's Plymouth Rock is a
Boulder, Massachusetts. Why wasn't that car 1492?

50:57 Yeah, right. It was claimed to have been at the
site where the Mayflower pilgrims landed to found
Plymouth Colony in

51:05 December of 1620. Yeah, that's very interesting.
I've never actually seen I I've heard of Plymouth Rock,
but I haven't actually looked at what was on

51:14 it. That's interesting. My only point is history can
kind of write itself. Why is

51:21 there a date carved into it that someone took a lot
of time to carve a granite

51:27 rock 1620? So there was something very
important about that exact date.

51:36 Yeah. I wonder if that's like the transition that's
when you know the the time and you know it seems
like the

51:43 let's say the early colonizers the guys that you know Lasowl Christopher Columbus if they were real it seems like

51:51 you know they were coming over when they thought they could come over like something happened something big happened either over there or across the

51:59 world because right when you know the first person comes right they all come it's like it's something took off right

52:06 And it and it kind of seems like that would have been maybe you know a little bit after a cataclysmic event or uh you

52:14 know whatever it may be but they all start to come at the same time. And I don't think it's just because they found America. I think it's because this was the right time to come you know for whatever reason it was.

52:25 Absolutely. And um uh I've done some history about the

52:31 Spanish. I do think that the Spaniards in the 1500s

52:38 uh uh went over to South America. They were gathering gold and silver and you know, and then of course we hear about

52:45 shipwrecks in the early 1700s of Spanish gallions, blah blah blah. uh in in Key West, Florida, they've got a museum by

52:54 Fisher where and a ship called Atoia from 1715 was found with a whole bunch of gold and silver, but it was Spanish

53:02 treasure. But that treasure was gathered in South America, brought to Puerto Rico, then from Puerto Rico took off and a hurricane

53:10 took it out to Florida region and sunk it. Yes.

53:14 Okay. And that was early 1700s. So, so in the 1600s

53:21 the Spaniards are gathering gold and silver is what I think, you know. So, anyway, yeah, there's a lot of history from 1600 on.

53:31 Um, now I, you know, you talk about Oh, okay. So, you're saying that America

53:38 was kind of founded early 1600s and it just kind of grew. And I say yes, it really wasn't before 1600.

53:48 There could be groups of people here and there. Yes, there was indigenous people. Absolutely. Yes.

53:56 I think as far as the English go, early 1600s is when they really started

54:03 pumping people over to colonize I call the East Coast. Now remember, there's

54:09 stories around late 1500s, early 1600s where the French went into Louisiana

54:16 area and the French went into the Quebec area and that's why they speak French there.

54:22 Yep. That's Lasale. That's Lasale that came down to Texas as well. Yes. Yeah.

54:27 And so they they were colonizing from let's call it the early 1600s on as well. and they just didn't want to go

54:35 into conflict with the English that were colonizing, say, the East Coast.

55:21 Blood. And so you had a spot where they could just pull up to and just start inhabiting.

59:07 I've got another person in Europe that had another take on it.

59:11 He went through Europe. He lives in Belgium. He's a professor as well, but he went through

59:19 Germany, Poland. Every building that's like a cathedral or a government type building, when you looked onto the

59:26 ceiling, they have a full painting on the ceiling.

59:31 Every one of them has an angel depiction.

59:37 Something to do with heaven, something to do with religious. Yeah.

59:41 And we see it all the time. I mean, it's so thick of religious art, you know, religious. Why would you? And

and it has

59:49 to do with a little cherubam going up to an angel in the middle. And then normal people are around the edges

59:57 in every one of the buildings. He ran with that four years ago and started documenting all the buildings and he

1:00:06 found none of them were without a religious ceiling.

1:00:12 Now, that's so wild.

1:00:14 When a government goes and conquers another nation, that's, you know, 1625.

1:00:21 Yeah. We beat the out of them. Yeah. Right.

1:00:25 Well, you're proud of that. So, you would do a mural of I defeated I'm the great president, leader, dictator, and I

1:00:34 beat the out of my next door neighbor. Yeah. I would paint that on a ceiling.

1:00:40 Why was every beautiful ceiling, first of all, 60

feet in the air painted

1:00:48 with an angel scene something perfectly, perfect, perfect, perfect. So, we got talking for years now, four years now.

1:00:57 And he goes, "Every I've started taking pictures of everything. I've got 400 pictures on my phone. They're all of

1:01:05 angelic scenes through every one of these cathedrals, whatever. Just old

1:01:13 world, I'm going to call them old world buildings. So, if you extrapolate that and you say, hm, could we have had a

1:01:21 millennial reign from 200 AD to, 200 AD? Okay, just what if?

1:01:30 Yeah. Well, if you're talking about Jesus is controlling and evil is, look

1:07:35 Library. If you think this is something, you ought to see the There's two buildings at Stanford University that

1:07:42 blow this one away." At Stanford, really? Here's some of Berkeley's. Here's Bacon Hall, right?

1:07:48 This is This is the I've been inside Bacon Hall. It's just It's more amazing inside. It's got granite,

1:07:54 marble, it's got marble flooring. It's beautiful.

1:07:59 Look at this. Look at this rotunda inside. And then these are different levels that circle with books. This is like, you know, I mean, you see these

1:08:06 libraries like Cincinnati's library that they had that was of course demolished.

1:08:11 They are extravagant buildings. And if these are old world buildings, right, and maybe these are old world books that

1:08:19 were originally there, where are those volumes? Where are those books? You know, there had been, you know what I mean?

1:08:24 I think we have controllers that destroyed it all. Absolutely.

1:08:27 We have absolute controllers that I hate to say it. I personally think the controllers were governed by e That's

1:08:36 the other thing. If there was a millennial reign, okay, and I'm speculating. I really don't want to

1:08:43 state, oh, I know for sure because I don't. But if there was a if there was a millennial reign and all these capital

1:08:52 type buildings and other granite type buildings were all built and they were built for the people that were now human

1:15:34 hard like okay it was magnificent and all these buildings none of them had gargoyles on it or a depiction of

1:15:42 Lucifer holding a this or that it that was added let's say 14 15 and 1600s on

1:15:50 what that was all added to all these buildings so that Lucifer was a evil was always a counterfeit to do

1:15:58 counterfeiting so if you see something magnificent why not put your face on it and your buddy's faces which are demons

1:16:07 and those type of things put all those all over it to say oh it's mine Yeah, of course. Because it's my world now.

1:16:15 Yeah, it's fine. We're everywhere. My little season is 5,600 years old.

1:16:21 That's my little season. I get to reign finally. Yeah. Blah blah blah blah blah. Okay.

1:16:27 Then another friend of mine, we were discussing that and he was an atheist of all things. And I said

1:16:36 the answer and he agreed with me, but he said, "But I don't believe in it can't be the millennial reign. I don't believe in Jesus. I don't believe in the Bible.

1:16:43 And I said, "You're educated. Read uh Revelation. I want you to read it every night for one month straight."

1:16:53 He came back at the end of the month and the first thing he said is, "I wrote every little thing down.

1:19:16 don't they're not budging like they've got Well, he wasn't budging at all. No, they they've got their mind back and said, "No, the way I take Revelation, the thousand-y year reign already happened.

1:19:26 And now, yes, we will come into tribulation. We'll come into seals.

1:19:30 We'll come into trumpets, bold judgments at the end." And at the very end of it, there's this thing called a great white throne judgment.

1:19:38 And he said, "That's real." And then that's at the end of it. And yes, and then at the end of all that, uh there's

1:19:45 going to be a judgment and a new heaven and a new earth is how it ends. And that's what's going to happen. There's no millennial after a great white throne judgment.

1:21:16 evidence just physical evidence you can look at. One, the buildings, two, the inside. Yeah.

1:21:24 So, I worked for a major I worked for I left California after uh my wife was killed in a car accident. I got a new

1:21:31 job at the University of Utah. I work on uh heating and air. Uh I work on chillers and boilers and

just keep things going. Okay.

1:21:43 17 years ago, my parents both went into wheelchairs and could not get around. I took them in and they both died last

1:21:53 year uh pretty much in each other's arms and I have a little and so I took I took them to all their specialty doctor appointments. I got

1:22:02 them the best care uh up at the University of Utah Hospital with specialists and uh uh and so I was

1:22:10 happy. They died in their mid 90s. I was happy to get them into a very good place. Both my parents did not believe in Jesus.

1:22:20 I started on YouTube watching little kid cartoon videos about the Bible. So, I watched cartoon videos

1:22:29 about Adam and Eve all the way through Jesus. That's great.

1:22:33 I [clears throat] was able to memorize those little 15minute lessons and give them to my parents.

1:22:39 And [laughter] both of them on their dying words, I said I said, "Mommy," and I said, "Daddy, at each day

that they

1:22:47 died, who are you going to ask for when you hold your guardian angel's hand?" And they both said, "Jesus." And upon

1:22:56 dying, right as they died and took their last breath, they both raised their arms straight up to the ceiling as somebody

1:23:04 was coming to grab him and take him up to heaven.

1:23:08 I just got chills big time. Wow. That's so beautiful. That is beautiful.

1:23:13 And the day before that my dad died because I had crashed an entire Bible down his throat the last year of his life.

1:23:22 Yeah. Right. And now he finally believed in a guardian angel. He finally believed that he would go to heaven if he believed in our beautiful Lord and Savior. Okay.

1:23:32 Yeah.

1:23:33 The day before he died, I walked in to ask, you know, if he would like some coffee or eggs in the morning, I walked

1:23:41 in and he pointed straight to the corner of the ceiling and he said, "Look at the lady." And I looked, I didn't see anything.

1:23:49 Yeah.

1:23:50 the most beautiful lady with white flowing hair.

1:23:54 I only and she was in a white robe, but I only saw from her chest up and she was beautiful like

1:24:03 20 years old. The most beautiful woman I ever laid eyes on. Angelic. Angelic.

1:24:08 She was an angel. And I said, "Dad, what did she say?" And she said, I couldn't understand what why she was saying it. for an hour. She just kept

1:24:16 looking at me and said, "Johnny, are you ready?" I said, "Dad, your mom's the

1:24:23 only one that ever called you Johnny." And I said, "Think of your mom, even

1:24:31 though she was older in life. She was 55 years old when you graduated from high school, and I know she had white hair,

1:24:38 but could that think of your mom as a teenager?" Yeah. Could that lady have possibly been

1:24:47 your mom? And you know, some resemblance. Yeah.

1:24:50 And he just looked at me like his face turned white.

1:24:55 He said that could have been easily my mother as a teenager. Wow. Wow.

1:25:02 And she was asking Johnny, "Are you ready? Are you ready to come join her?

1:25:08 To come join her?" Yeah. And Wow. And he just looked at her like, "What are you talking about?" Wow.

1:25:15 And I said, "Dad, whether it was your guardian angel or your mother, I said, "You're going to be out of here within one or two days." Yeah.

1:25:23 If a guardian angel is already asking, "Are you ready? There's your ticket.

1:25:28 Your free agency, your free choice." I said,
"You're gonna just kind of die,

1:25:36 wake up after being dead, and you're just
basically going to walk out of your body. She's going to
be standing there, and she's going to take you up to

1:25:44 heaven." Grab your hand and go. Yeah.

1:25:46 Grab your hand and go. But don't forget to ask
her to see Jesus, and I bet you will.

1:25:52 That's beautiful. You got so many good stories
about that. and the people that you have, you know,
turned over to to, you know, Christ and and to God is
it's been a beautiful thing, man.

1:26:02 I just firmly believe you need to believe in your
Lord and Savior. That's the number one thing.

1:26:09 Jesus never said, well, he was on earth, you
must go to church or you His disciples just walked
around and talked about Jesus. Yeah.

1:26:20 Believe in Jesus. That's all they ever said.

1:26:23 Did y'all hear that? He just said, "I don't go to
church, but I believe in Jesus." That's how easy it is,

you know?

1:26:29 I mean, you don't it it's not a bad thing if you don't attend church or if you don't believe in this system of religion because it is a system and it's

1:26:38 about all the things that the devil would make it about, right? [laughter] Money and and and all. So, yeah. I mean,

1:26:45 you know, and I wouldn't call myself a u you know, 100% a Christian either. And I don't even know what I am, but I know there's a God. I know there's a creator.

1:26:54 Um I know a lot of the stories that you're talking about there are angelic beings. This is this place is a we're in a spiritual war. This is what it is.

1:27:04 Like we are in a spiritual war. So all of that connects. You don't have to have what I got. I'm such a uh you know I I I

1:27:12 think a little too deep about things and I get a little you know like too in the weeds. Too in the weeds and I definitely did on on religion and stuff. But if it

1:27:20 feels right for you, if you feel right and you're a good person day in and day out, like Jack here, like how I think I am, then you're on the right track.

1:27:28 That's as simple as it is. If you know that there's a creator, uh, you know, and and all of that packaged into one, you're doing the right thing. I used to

1:27:35 kick myself so much for not reading the Bible every day or going to going to church because that's what we're told we

1:27:42 need to do in order to transcend, I guess you could say. But that isn't it.

1:27:47 That's just that's part of the system that we're in that makes us think we need to do that. If you feel in your gut, you you know that gut feeling, if

1:27:55 you feel like you're doing right in life, then you're doing right. Just keep up waking up and doing doing what you're doing.

1:28:00 Yeah, I agree. Yeah.

1:28:02 So now, um let's talk about one little thing that is odd. My dad was born in a

1:28:10 home in 1930 and in the 60s and 70s I used to go to that home because my grandparents lived

1:28:17 there and they bought it in my grandparents bought it in before World War I and around 1915.

1:28:27 Mhm.

1:28:27 And they supposedly bought it from an architect that designed in the late 1800s Victorian style homes. And the

1:28:37 home was built like an 1880. They bought the home in Berkeley in 1915, blah blah blah. There was this cute little iron railing around the house. Mhm.

1:28:48 And before my dad died, I not only talked to him about it, but he even

1:28:55 said, "You just blew my mind." That's the home right there. Okay. It's hard to see, but there is an iron railing.

1:29:05 Well, there's rail right here that goes around that that's the railing now. Yeah.

1:29:09 Right. Okay. No, go the other way. Go the other way. And right there is a a gate, a an iron gate that you

open and walk to the front door.

1:29:20 Look at this palm tree, guys. Like, look at that thing. But yes. Okay, now keep in mind a hundred-year-old palm

1:29:26 tree is still only a foot round. And that palm tree is about five feet round.

1:29:33 So that palm tree was not planted in 1880. It was planted hundreds of years before. Many more years. Yes, I agree. Yes.

1:29:42 Okay. Anyway, so as a little child, I opened and closed that gate always and

1:29:49 it had iron hinge with an iron little round disc that went over it. Yeah. Right. No, just just a block and a and a loop.

1:29:58 So, a point and a little loop. Yeah. Yeah. Yeah. Gotcha. High and low.

1:30:04 From the time of my early 1960s to about the early 1970s

1:30:11 before 1970, I said to my dad, "Dad, I have opened and closed this all my life.

1:30:19 It has never squeaked." Yeah. This iron [laughter] has never squeaked. Yeah.

1:30:25 Who's heard of that? Who's heard of that? 1880s this house was built, right? You said 1880s. The I'm sure the gate was soon after.

1:30:33 Yeah. Never squeaked. even keep going.

1:30:35 And my dad said, "I was born here in this home in the living room and I also went all the way through

1:30:43 school here in Berkeley and I've gone in and out of that gate a million times and I have never heard it squeak either." Interesting.

1:30:52 So then before he died, I talked about it because I was starting to get into all these old buildings and he said,

1:30:59 "Wow, I never thought about this subject." But he said, "You know, I wonder if the house I was born in

1:31:08 is from like way back, you know, it would and he said cuz it all has to do with that iron gate.

1:31:17 It's it sounds pristine still, right? It just and it Yeah.

1:31:22 No, no, no. like iron on iron for years being in the weather, the rain

1:31:32 and there's no coating on it. There's no paint, no coating. And it look at it. Look at it in this picture,

1:31:39 though. I mean, it still is very pristine. I mean, it's got all the shapes you see down here on the on the bars. Like, it's got all the shapes are

1:31:47 still there. It is. I It looks It looks older, but not like it's a hundred years old [laughter] or however much. You know what I mean?

1:31:56 Yeah. This is old. Yeah.

1:31:58 And then you look at the You look at the house, and this looks like your typical oldw world house that we see, you know, two-story house in early early cities.

1:32:08 This is 1880 California, guys, in Berkeley. Like that this shouldn't be here that early. I mean, you know, I'm sure a couple, but I mean, this whole

1:32:17 this whole house is says old world all over it, right?

1:32:22 Interesting. Yeah. And so, you think this iron maybe was uh you know, from the previous people that that actually made that?

1:32:30 You know, it I'm just going to say as a little kid, I asked my dad and then

1:32:37 as he's a year away from dying, I I asked him again. And I said, "90 years you've been going in and out

1:32:46 of that gate." Yeah. And it never squeaked. What's the deal?

1:32:52 And he said, "You and my dad told me, you just blew my mind because that opens up a can of worms." How when two things

1:33:02 are raw iron put together, but yet they never grind, they never rust, and they never squeak. How? What type of iron is

1:33:11 it? How does that work? Okay, enough of that. Go on.

1:33:15 Well, we Well, but we've seen we you you've seen these types of houses and you've seen these

types of gates and stuff. I mean, this house is is old.

1:33:23 That's a old old house. And it doesn't look like it's, you know, I mean, it looks maybe 40, 50 years old, but it doesn't look as old as it, you know, is supposed to be. And certainly the gate.

1:33:34 And I mean, we see a lot of these. I just talked about on a previous video recently I did of Have you ever seen Mark Hopkins uh um his house?

1:33:44 San Francisco insane. It's a castle.

1:33:47 Let me pull it up. Yeah, it's a castle. No, it is. It is. And it's it's massive.

1:33:52 And you know, Mark Hopkins built that house, but he died before he could even get in it. It's one of those stories, right? Um San Francisco. I don't know

1:34:00 how relevant this is, but uh there's a story that okay 1849

1:34:07 California there was a a gold rush and so people are rushing to California.

1:34:12 They're rushing to um uh the Sierra Neadas to go into all the rivers and hunt for gold. Okay. But yet, as

they're

1:34:22 coming into the like the port of San Francisco by ship and then they're trying to uh go pan for gold, everybody

1:34:30 had gold fever. So to say that all these buildings are built from 1850 to 1890

1:34:39 when everybody had gold fever that was rushing up to the Sierra Nevada mountains to hunt for gold.

1:34:47 Yeah. And there was a story that my dad told me years ago that Yes. There's a

1:34:54 California state capital in Sacramento, California. I think it's still the capital of California. It is.

1:35:01 Now, that's a tiny capital. It's only a million square feet. Now, if you pull up, if you pull up, is that Sacramento?

1:35:12 Yeah. And and listen, this was built in the 1870s as well, people. So, Oh, yeah. Sure. Yeah. Right. Right.

1:35:18 I'm gonna say 6 to 700 AD is what I'm going to say. Yeah. Right. Now, pull up San Francisco City Hall.

1:35:26 Oh, yeah. I know, man.

1:35:28 And that's 3 million square feet. So, I heard that there was a letter that went back to Washington DC that said,

1:35:35 "We've got a better Capitol building in downtown San Francisco." Yes, you do.

1:35:42 And where do you want the capital of California to be? Oh, well, the gold is closest to Sacramento, so let's make

1:35:49 that the capital. Because the president at the time did not have any idea how

1:35:57 grand this capital type building was.

1:36:03 Look at this in San Francisco. Granite and marble.

1:36:07 And they're supposedly built that for the gold rush people.
