World's Fair 1904.

How did the Pyreliophorus work?

Giant mirror array:

The apparatus consisted of a huge steel structure, approximately 13 meters high. Mounted on it was a parabolic concave mirror with an area of approximately 80 square meters, equipped with exactly 6,117 individual small mirrors.
